

Checklist for FAMILY REUNION with a MINOR Belgian citizen (Art. 40ter)

For foreigners of third countries who want to reunite with a Belgian child (who has not used its right to free movement – Directive 2004/38/EC)

It is essential that your file contains the following:

Two sets of your entire visa application (application form and supporting documents), plus any original documents that are to be returned to you, such as your original police and medical certificate.

Application form

<u>Two</u> (2) application forms duly filled in, signed and dated by the applicant.

This form is available free of charge online or at VFS and the Embassy. You complete it in English, French, Dutch, or German.

Photo

Two (2) recent (no more than 6-months old) passport size photographs (dimensions: 35 by 45 mm) should be affixed to the application form (but not glued).

Copy of Visa

For non-Australian/New Zealand passport holders only: one copy of your residence permit or of your visa for Australia/New Zealand. Submit your up-to-date VEVO details for Australia or VisaView details for New Zealand.

Passport

A valid passport:

- should have been issued within the previous 10 years;
- should be valid for more than 12 months;
- should contain at least 2 empty facing pages when applying for the visa.

Administrative fee

The applicant has to provide the proof of payment of the **administrative fee** at the submission of his/her application. If this is not the case, the visa application is not admissible. The administrative fee needs to be paid directly to the Home Affairs Office in Brussels.

Copy of Belgian ID Card (both sides) or passport of the child to be joined in Belgium

Proof of relationship to the minor child

An original birth certificate mentioning the name of both parents, legalized by means of an **<u>Apostille</u>**.

- In case the parents are divorced: an original divorce decree mentioning to whom of the parents full custody was entrusted, with Apostille
- In case of shared custody, an original authorization letter from the parent who will not live in Belgian with the child, stating that the child can permanently leave
- In case the child was adopted, an original adoption certificate with Apostille
- In case a parent has deceased: an original death certificate with Apostille

If the child is registered in the Belgian national register, only a copy of the birth certificate is required.

Proof of Belgian nationality of the child

If the child is registered in the Belgian national register, no further proof is required.

Proof of joining child in Belgium or travelling together to Belgium

One of the following:

Proof that the applicant and the child are travelling to Belgium, such as flight bookings with the travelers names on them.

OR

Proof that the child already lives in Belgium and the applicant is going to join the child.

The documents drawn up abroad in a language other than Dutch, French, German or English are to be translated in accordance with the original by an official translator. The translation must be legalized as a separate document in line with the procedure laid down in the country of origin, and then by the competent Belgian consulate or Embassy.

Applicants, who cannot enclose all documents from the list, should consider adding alternatives or making an explanation about the reason for not handing them in. The applicant is hereby informed that submitting the above-mentioned documents does not guarantee automatic issuance of a visa.
