



Checklist for MARRIAGE IN BELGIUM

*For national of a third country outside the European Economic Area (EEA) and travelling to marry a Belgian citizen or a foreigner residing temporarily in Belgium (Card A or H) or for unlimited duration (holding a CIRE or CIE, or a B, C, D, F or F+ residence card)

It is essential that your file contains the following:

Passport

A valid passport:

- should have been issued within the previous 10 years;
- should be valid at least 3 months after the intended date of departure from the Schengen territory or, in the case of several visits, after the last intended date of departure;
- should contain at least 2 empty facing pages when applying for the visa.

Please provide one copy of the passport (the empty pages don't need to be copied).

Copy of visa status

Proof of your visa for Australia/New Zealand. Submit your up-to-date VEVO details for Australia or VisaView details for New Zealand. For another country, submit a copy of your residence permit.

Application form

Two application forms duly filled in, signed and dated by the applicant.

Photo

Two passport photos not older than 6 months (dimensions: 35 by 45 mm).

The relationship

A chronological history of the relationship with the future spouse.

Age

- Applicant
 - Birth certificate;

OR

Proof that he/she is over 18 years old if marrying a Belgian citizen

OR

Proof that he/she is over 21 years old if marrying a foreign national.

Future spouse

- $_{\odot}$ $\,$ Proof that your future spouse is aged over 18 years old if he/she is a Belgian citizen \mathbf{OR}
- Proof that your future spouse is aged over 21 years old if he/she is a foreign national.

Deed of Declaration of Marriage

A copy of the deed of declaration of marriage done within the 6 months prior to the visa application, established by the city hall in Belgium where the marriage will be celebrated.

Proof of Travel insurance policy

The insurance must be valid throughout all of the Schengen countries and must cover the whole duration of the stay or transit. The minimum cover is EUR 30,000.

The insurance must cover the cost of repatriation on medical grounds, urgent medical treatment and/or urgent hospital treatment or costs incurred in the event of death while in the Schengen area.

Applicant's Solvency

Documents indicating that the applicant has **sufficient personal means of subsistence**, both for the duration of his/her stay on the SCHENGEN territory and for the transit to a third country in which his/her admission is guaranteed,

OR

Letter of guarantee (in the prescribed form "Annexe 3bis"/"Bijlage 3bis") not older than 6 months, original and printed recto/verso.

The guarantor should be able to prove to have a regular net monthly income of at least 800 € + 150 € for each dependent family member in Belgium + 150 € for the partner joining him/her.

In this case, a copy of the guarantor's 3 most recent salary slips /guarantor's most recent tax sheet/ other official proof of the guarantor's solvency must be provided.

Medical Certificate

A medical certificate attesting that you are not carrying any of the diseases which might endanger public health. This certificate must be no older than 6 months from the date of issuance. The specific form must be signed and stamped by an **approved doctor**.

Non-Criminal Record Certificate

For applicants over 18, an official certificate attesting to the lack of any convictions for crimes or offences under common law.

This document has to be legalized by means of an <u>Apostille</u>. You can obtain the Apostille from the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade in Australia / Department of Internal Affairs in New Zealand (or the relevant government institution in other countries).

This certificate must be no older than 6 months from date of issuance.

Copy of ID Card/residence permit of the future spouse in Belgium

Copy of the identity card of the Belgian citizen

OR

Copy of the residence permit of the foreign national (Card A, B, C, D, F, F+ or H) the applicant is marrying in Belgium.

Sufficient Accommodation

Proof that the party being joined has sufficient accommodation: a registered rental contract or proof of property in Belgium.

Solvency of the person to be joined

Proof that the person being joined has stable, regular and sufficient income to (a) provide in his own and his family's needs and (b) to prevent that they become a burden to the Belgian government. This means a minimum monthly net income of EUR 1628,83.

Mutual Insurance Company / Travel Insurance

Proof that the person to be joined is affiliated to a Mutual Insurance Company (Mutualiteit / Mutualité) and confirming that the risks will be covered for the family members as soon as they will arrive in Belgium.

Or

Proof applicant has a valid travel insurance for at least 90 days from date of entry into Schengen.

NOTE

*The applicant who is going to marry a citizen of the European Union (not a Belgian citizen) or of the European Economic Area (EEA), or a Swiss citizen or a Belgian citizen who had legal residence in another EU country prior settling in Belgium, should apply for a visa based on EU Directive 2004/38/CR (see specific information list).

Applicants who cannot enclose all documents from the list, should consider adding alternatives or making an explanation about the reason for not handing them in. The applicant is hereby informed that submitting the above-mentioned documents does not guarantee automatic issuance of a visa.

The documents drawn up abroad in a language other than Dutch, French or German or English are to be translated in accordance with the original by a sworn translator. The translation must be legalized as a separate document in line with the procedure laid down in the country of origin, and then by the competent Belgian consulate or Embassy.

Disclaimer

This checklist comprises all documents that are part of my visa application. I understand that the Embassy will decide on my visa application based on these documents only. I also understand that in exceptional cases additional documents may be requested by the Embassy, even documents that do not feature on this list at all.
